Han Mitakuyapi,

There are multiple priorities and needs that come to the leadership table week to week and day to day, many are emergency and crisis situations. This takes much time to assess situations and how they can be addressed and, in most cases, where funding can be allocated from.

A most pressing collective issue is the state of our Dakota language and culture, we have lost

many fluent speakers the past few years. It is estimated there are over 100 fluent speakers over the age of 60 years and less than 20 people under the age of 60. These statistics are dire and emergent and thus the need for a collective Dakota language strategy on how we can increase these through existing and new programming. For all those that attended the Dakota Language gathering held recently in Whitecap Dakota Nation and those that work in this programming or have an interest we are putting out a call to be part of this process.

We heard different types of programming and ways that other Dakota, Lakota, and Nakota communities are working to increase their fluent speakers, we can assess and develop these into our own long-term plan. We heard from our Dakota Elders that we need to start with ceremony and prayer to guide our work in a good way. To frame our process and put good thoughts and intentions that we can achieve more fluent speakers at every age level. I am confident that with a community driven plan, with fluent speakers' part of the process, with the active participation of all those wanting to learn we will have more fluent speakers each successive year.

Part of our call to action is the recording of our stories and songs for the long-term preservation of our culture and language. It is important to

capture and document our oral history, it is about telling our own unique history and story and educating not only our children but others who have not been told the true history of our Dakota people. Our communications department is set up for recording when people are free to share a story, teaching, or songs in the language, translation can be provided for educational use. I encourage anyone interested to contact myself or communications to discuss this going forward.

A key area both Councillor Carol Johnson and I would like to discuss is women and supporting one another through healing. Women in general have faced increased discrimination, abuses, violence, and other negative issues as a result of colonialism, genocidal law and policies stemming from residential schools etc. Women have always been the backbone and strength in the families, and we would like to discuss ways we can support all women of all ages, from our young girls to Elders through various support and healing methods. We are calling all women to join us on Wednesday, June 12 from 6-8 pm at the Community Centre to begin this discussion.

We will also collectively look at the MMIWG Calls for Justice and how our community can begin to implement these important recommendations. There is a role for everyone to find ways to address the historical, multigenerational, and intergenerational trauma, and social and economic marginalization of our Indigenous women and girls, and 2SLGBTQIA people to live in dignity, and with health and safety.

As we move closer to the end of the school year, I give thanks and acknowledge our educators for their hard work in providing a quality education to our children and youth. I encourage all parents to ensure their children and youth continue to attend school, we are counting on our youth as the future leaders in our community. There are many careers that we need our young people to consider in the fields of health, education, customer service, trades, etc. We are pleased to see there will be a number of graduates for high school to post secondary this year, we will showcase them in the next newsletter.

I recently attended a gathering and was fortunate to be gifted 250-year-old tobacco seeds. I have shared these with our gardening team, and they will collaborate with Southeast Resource Development Council tobacco cessation staff for best practices in growing these. Our plan is to start traditional tobacco planting and to share the harvest with our Elders and all those that require ceremonial tobacco this fall. This will go in hand with our gathering, preparing, and using *čanśaša* which has been used since time immemorial.



Finally, I wanted to share highlights of our Strategic Plan in summary form, which was developed collaboratively with our Directors and Program Managers. Strategic plans are important to providing a long-term vision, mission, and strategic direction for our community. Our inspiration for this work is the children and our future generations. Our Dakota ancestors lived a holistic and resilient life that ensured a way of life for us today. Our role and responsibility in this generation is to continue that forward planning and generational thinking to leave a legacy behind. We want our children and future generations to inherit a strong governance foundation that is built on a healthy environment, healthy families, Dakota culture and language, and self sufficiency.

Our high-level goals include the following:

Enhancing Governance – through strengthening our internal capacity, building effective partnerships and relationships, and improving our communications.

Transformation of Education – building a qualified workforce and supporting our children and youth to succeed through an enhanced delivery of education built on Dakota philosophy and worldview.

Promotion of Dakota Way of Life – revitalization of Dakota Wicohan through incorporation and protection of Dakota culture and language in our programs and service delivery.

Holistic Delivery of Health and Wellness – improving the health and wellness of our people through a multi faceted approach.

Lands and Economic Vitality – building a long-term sustainable plan for our lands, waters, and environment through an energy efficient and traditional knowledge lens.

Housing, Infrastructure, and Emergency Management – understanding and building a long-term asset management plan for our housing and infrastructure. Developing a robust emergency management plan that contemplates climate change for the future.

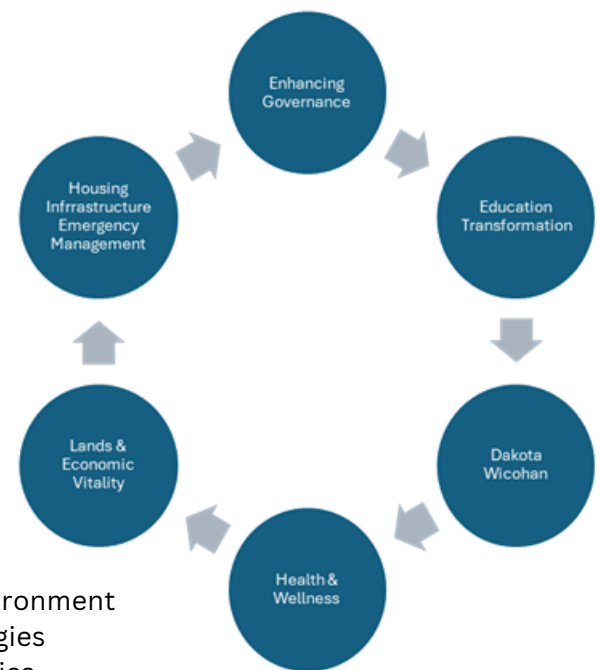

My name is Kendra Kakewash and I work in the Intergovernmental Relations and Implementation Department.

IRID has been actively progressing with continuous improvements and refinements. We are excited to commemorate the 10th Year Anniversary of the Sioux Valley Dakota Nation Self-Governance Agreements on July 4. Please mark your calendars for this significant date.



Open House Events: We successfully hosted open houses in Sioux Valley Dakota Nation, Brandon and Winnipeg. These events provided valuable opportunities to connect with community members, discuss ongoing and future initiatives, and gather feedback. We are looking forward to seeing you again in the near future. We thank those who filled out the evaluations. We will be taking your recommendations into consideration.

Professional Development: I have recently attended professional development sessions through AFOA Canada and TULU Centre of Indigenous Economics to enhance our department's capacity.

AFOA Canada provided workshops on Community Engagement & Community and External Relations. Both these workshops align closely with my current research "Impacts of Colonialism on Community Engagement". By examining these historical disruptions, I am to restore traditional governance practices where decision-making was rooted within the community, emphasizing collective leadership and community consensus. The Tulo Centre of Indigenous Economics focuses on economic development and self-governance for Indigenous Nations. Tulo emphasizes the importance of self-sufficiency and the sustainable management of resources.

Community Engagement: For those who requested the Sioux Valley Dakota Nation laws that were presented at the Open Houses, I will be sending them out shortly. Your interest and involvement are crucial to the success of our initiatives, and I am committed to ensuring you have the information needed.

The CIS status cards have been updated and have a holographic foil bar on the top front of the card and micro text below the header.

All previously issued versions of the CIS status card are valid until their renewal date.

White SCIS status card – You can apply for the white SCIS status card 2 ways,

1. A Valid Government issued ID. or
2. A CIS status card and a health card

Before, you were able to use just your CIS status card to apply but guidelines have changed, so please remember to bring all your ID with you when applying for your white SCIS status card. I encourage everyone to come see me to apply for the white SCIS status card.

Fine Option – Anyone who wants to finish their fine option on the reserve, please remember to bring your probation order paper with you when applying. If you don't have that paper, call your probation officer for a copy.

Birth registration: To register your child/children, you must complete the birth registration form and have your child's original birth certificate with the parents' names on it and a copy of the parents' valid ID. Those 2 components must go along with your application. If you are unable to obtain a birth certificate to register your child/children, please contact me and I will help you.

My main objective in Band Membership is get all the children registered and I'm busy working on that every day and I also assist a lot of our band members in many other areas like helping Elders who need to apply for the Canadian Pension Plan, Commissioner for Oath, Administrator of Estate forms, Health card applications, my office door is always open, and everyone is welcome, with that I would like to end of with our Population Statistic's as of April 30, 2024 & by wishing everyone a Happy, Fun Filled SUMMER!!

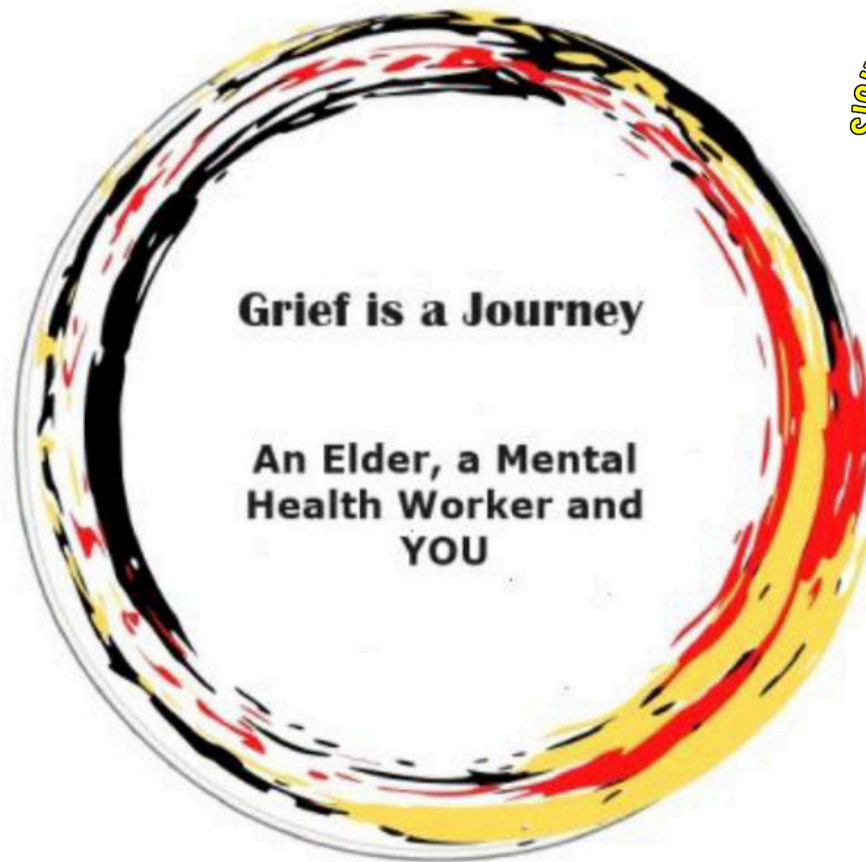

Indian Boarding Home Program Class Action Lawsuit

A class action lawsuit has been filed on behalf of those affected by the Indian Boarding Home program. This program took children from First Nations communities and Inuit villages and sent them to live with families or private homes in other communities (often non-indigenous) for the purpose of attending off-reserve schools, from September 1st 1951 to June 30 1992. The lawsuit is to provide justice, recognition, and compensation for those that participate and suffered abuse, mistreatment, loss of culture and language.

The claims process will start on Wednesday August 21, 2024

Your Residential School Records

If you made an Independent Assessment Process (IAP) or Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) claim, you have four options for your records:

1. Do nothing and your records will remain confidential until they are destroyed on September 19, 2027.
2. Get a copy for yourself to keep or share with others by submitting the [Request Form \(PDF\)](#).
3. Preserve them for history, public education and research at the NCTR by submitting this [Consent form \(PDF\)](#).
4. Get a copy for yourself and preserve them for history, public education and research at the NCTR by submitting both the Request and Consent forms.

The choice is yours and yours alone and your IAP or ADR records are confidential. For more information:
